

Re: Findings from Polling Among Likely Democratic Primary Voters in MD-04

A recent survey of Democratic primary voters in Maryland's 4th congressional district shows that Glenn Ivey has pulled into a double-digit lead over Donna Edwards heading into the final month of the race. This race remains competitive, and more than one-quarter of voters remain undecided, but Ivey has made significant progress over the past few months. The following are key findings from the poll:

Ivey has a 13-point lead over Edwards. Ivey currently leads with 40% of the vote to Edwards' 27%, with Angela Angel picking up 4% support and 29% of voters undecided. This is a net 29-point gain in just two months, from when Ivey trailed Edwards 24% to 40%. Ivey leads throughout all key regions within the district and among key subgroups, including Black women, younger voters, and self-identified liberals. Despite these tailwinds, just under a third of voters (29%) are still undecided - while Ivey has the momentum, there is still work to be done to win this race.



Ivey is well-liked and his popularity is continuing to grow. Seven-in-ten voters know Ivey and he is well-liked, having improved his popularity since April. Two-thirds (64%) of voters are favorable towards him, up from 57% in April. However, 31% of voters still need an introduction to Ivey, and with the necessary resources, he will be able to continue spreading his message and increasing his support.

These findings are based on the results of a phone and text-to-web survey conducted by Impact Research from June 18 – 22, 2022 among N=400 likely 2022 Democratic primary voters in Maryland's 4th congressional district. The results are subject to a margin of error of ±4.9 percentage points.
